Medical Negligence - A

radiologist was blamed for missing a lesion on the plaintiff's spine while reviewing a chest CT scan after a gallbladder surgery – the lesion grew quickly over a year, so much so, that it resulted in a burst fracture of the plaintiff's spine – this burst has left the plaintiff paralyzed from the waist down

Verdict: \$10,407,839 for plaintiff Court: **Boyd**, J. Davis, 4-20-12 Calvin Bradley, then age 56,

calvin Bradley, then age 56, underwent a laparoscopic cholecystectomy in April of 2008. As he recovered from that surgery, a chest CT scan was taken. It was reviewed by a radiologist, Dr. Mayola Boykin. Boykin reported it as normal.

In fact Boykin had missed a dangerous and fast-growing lesion on Bradley's spine at the T-10 level. Over the next ten months, the lesion continued to grow. Suddenly on 2-24-09 the growth of the lesion caused a burst fracture of Bradley's spine at the T-10 level. Bradley has since been paralyzed from the waist down and is wheelchair bound. He also relies on a colostomy.

Bradley sued Boykin and alleged error by her in misreading the CT scan and thereby missing the lesion. His proof described the lesion as large, open and destructive, the standard of care requiring her to report it. The theory further developed that had Boykin made the correct diagnosis, paralysis would have been avoided as the lesion could have been treated with radiation.

[Interestingly while the lesion was cancerous and by the time of trial, Bradley was in the terminal stages of the disease, the record indicates it was not tried as a cancer case.]

Bradley's radiology expert was Dr. Richard Baron, Chicago, IL. His medical bills were \$432,121 and future care was valued at \$2,686,640. Catherine Ingebrigtsen, Fernandina Beach, FL, served as the life care plan expert. Lost wages were \$152,708, Bradley seeking \$505,009 more for impairment. The plaintiff's economist was William Cobb,

Charleston, WV. The plaintiff also sought \$9,000,000 for pain and suffering, his wife seeking \$1,000,000 more for her consortium interest.

Boykin defended the case and postured that a reasonably competent radiologist would not have reported this lesion. Her radiology experts were Dr. Dennis Whaley, Lexington and Dr. Amjad Alkadri, Valparaiso, IN. A third expert, Dr. Ivan Borrello, Oncology, Baltimore, MD, indicated in his CR 26 disclosures that he was prepared to discuss Bradley's limited life expectancy

Jefferson County

Bus Negligence - A conventioneer in downtown Louisville was struck by a TARC bus while crossing the street and she was knocked unconscious - \$217,265 p. 3

False Imprisonment - The plaintiff was detained at check-cashing loan firm after she tried to pay a loan back with what was believed to be a counterfeit bill – the detention lasted 90 minutes or so until a Secret Service agent verified the bill was good – the plaintiff sued the loan firm and alleged false imprisonment - Defense p. 7

Hospital Negligence - Nurses were blamed for a botched fecal disimpaction that was linked to a painful bowel injury - Defense

Boyd County

Medical Negligence - A radiologist was blamed for misreading a CT scan and missing signs of a growing spinal lesion – months it grew so much the plaintiff's spine burst and he suffered permanent paralysis - \$10,407,839 p. 1

Pike County

Truck Negligence - The plaintiff suffered neck and back injuries when rear-ended by a loaded coal truck - \$118,386 p. 3

Boone County

Employment Contract/Fraud - *The CEO of a large truck trailer* manufacturing firm alleged he was lured to stay with the company with a guaranteed contract - \$2,000,000 p. 4

Warren County

Fraudulent Misrepresentation - The owner of a feed business in Bowling Green alleged his business was shut down and damaged by a municipal electrical inspector who misrepresented a power failure at the feed business was caused by a rodent infestation – in fact the power failure was caused by a heavy storm and related water damage - \$970,000 p. 5

Bullitt County

Breach of Contract - A truck driving school alleged it suffered damage because of the breach of a contract by the City of Hillview to sell it an adjoining parcel – the lack of extra space, the theory went, inhibited the company's growth - \$11,435,259 p. 5

Johnson County

Premises Liability - Walking out of a motel, the plaintiff tripped on a smooth tile floor and fell - Defense p. 6

Hardin County

Invasion of Privacy - After a bitter romantic break-up, the defendant boyfriend was alleged to have sent explicit e-mails from his girlfriend's account to her family and military co-workers – he denied sending the e-mails in spite of police testimony that linked the e-mails to his computer – the defendant also presented a counterclaim alleging the girlfriend infected him with herpes - \$55,000 p. 7

Floyd County

UIM - While the plaintiff complained of soft-tissue symptoms and the "destruction of her nerves" following a right of way crash, her UIM award was far below a \$100,000 floor of coverage - \$15,581 p. 7

Oldham County

Medical Negligence - A prison nurse was blamed for missing signs of an impending cardiac catastrophe, the plaintiff dying of a heart attack soon after seeing the nurse in the infirmary and complaining of chest pain - Defense p. 8

Federal Court - Covington

False Arrest - The owner of a business that provides document services to the Hispanic community was arrested by deputy sheriffs who believed she engaged in document fraud – the fraud, the deputies thought, represented her notarizing a document without verifying the address of the signor or that they used a tax identification number. instead of a Social Security number - Defense p. 8

Mason County

Assault - The plaintiff was paralyzed in a shooting at a private club - he took damages from three empty chair defendants - \$12,101,275 p. 8

Federal Court - Ashland

First Amendment - Three employees of the Rowan County PVA's office were summarily fired when a new PVA took over because of their political speech - Defense p. 9

Memphis Tennessee

Medical Negligence - In this unusual "wrongful birth" case, the parents of a girl born with Cystic Fibrosis sued a doctor and his genetics firm that botched a test that was designed to screen for the disease – the parents already had a daughter with CF and wanted to be sure implanted embryos were not positive for the disease – fault was directed by the court, the jury considering only the damages of the parents - \$13,113,240 p. 9

A Notable Indiana Verdict

South Bend, Indiana

Truck Negligence - A trucker ran a red light and the plaintiff's vehicle was flipped and obliterated – the plaintiff (age 20 and a new mother) suffered multiple fractures and internal injuries - \$5,630,550 p. 10
